### **Christmas Traditions**

hristmas is in the air, and it is a season of joy, laughter, and remembrance of traditions from when we were younger. It appears because of our varied ethnic backgrounds that we have had opportunities to celebrate the birth of Jesus in fun and exciting ways. So, as I look around the congregation I can see many who may have experienced Christmas differently than the person who may be sitting next to you. In that mindset let's take a quick trip around to various portions of the globe and remember how

our parents or grandparents may have celebrated Christmas.

As we set sail our first stop is in Mexico where the focus is upon the continual building of the nativity. The culmination is on Christmas Eve when there is a great procession of people traveling from house to house pretending to find a warm place where they can stay. They are turned away like Mary and Joseph, but then when they find the perfect place the baby Jesus is placed into the Nativity. The atmosphere is filled with pinatas and sweets to add to the festive atmosphere.

In traveling further south we next arrive in Ecuador where they celebrate like their Mexican and Argentinean cousins. They celebrate by either baking cookies or more specifically bread. In most houses you will see a nativity scene or pesebres that has a couple of extra characters that have joined them. These characters are llamas and burros, these are not just any llamas or burros because they are made from bread. They people do not eat the bread themselves, but once Christmas has come and gone, they are then crumbled and it is fed to the aves

(birds). The journey continues as we travel a little further as we arrive in Argentina where the weather is warm. They decorate their homes with wreaths filled with gold, red, and white flowers. They place cotton balls on their trees to imitate snow. The pesebre or nativity is placed near the Christmas tree and becomes the focus of their celebration. Then on Christmas Eve they float globos, colored tissue balloons that are illuminated with lights

from inside. It is so festive, especially when the time arrives for fireworks that illuminate the sky to announce the birthday of the Christ child.

Before we leave South America we make two more stops. The first stop is in Brazil and we observe the Christmas trees illuminated with bright lights and glistening with bright colored glass balls. The focus is still the presipio, Nativity, which can be found in every home, church, and all of the store front windows. Christmas is the greatest day of celebration that happens in their country. Then we make the final stop of South America as

we arrive in Venezuela. They start to cele-

brate their Christmas festivities on December 16th. They start each day from December 16th until Christmas Day with a special early morning church service. As the start of the service approaches you hear the sounds of firecrackers exploding and the church bells ringing. Before they go to bed in the evening many children and youngsters put on their roller skates and tie a long piece of string to the skate and hang the other end out the window where other skaters and passersby can give it a tug

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to let the sleeping person know that it is time to wake up and join in the service and celebration. After church has concluded they have fellowship consisting of tostados and coffee. Again every home has a nativity scene where they have added goats to join the sheep.

In passing through the Caribbean country of Haiti we find that they do many things similar to America, but their focus

is upon the giant nativity scenes that fill every house. Then on Christmas Eve they clean their shoes and stuff them with hay which is placed out on their porches in hope that Papa Noel will take the straw and



replace it presents placed near their shoes. On Christmas Eve they also go to church for midnight service, the launching of fireworks, and the singing of Christmas carols. They would then celebrate with a tradition called Réveillon that is a huge feast that will last until sunrise.

Crossing the ocean, we next arrive on the African continent and the country of Nigeria. The birth of Jesus is celebrated by joining in at any one of the pageants that tell the story of Jesus' birth. The pageant in beautiful and will last several hours long. As you are observing the pageant you will hear the drums being beaten throughout the night as they welcome the baby Jesus. Then as we depart from Nigeria we venture out over the reserves, plains, and forests to descend upon Kenya. Their tradition is to spend part of Christmas hurrying out to visit relatives that are outside the areas where they reside, much like the shepherds hurried to see the Christ child. The families gather together and prepare for a time of prayer and services and then celebrate by having a feast consisting of chicken, goat, lamb, and beef dishes.

The time has come for us to board an airplane as we are whisked away to the country of Australia. On Christmas Eve we gather in large groups where we will sit on blankets, light candles, and sing Christmas carols. Because we are in the middle of summer, we prepare a feast that is more like an American barbecue consisting of cooked chicken, fruit salad, and ice cream. It is so festive and fun with all the singing and celebrating.

Heading northward we then arrive in Japan. This country has very few Christians, and as a result it is not a religious holiday celebrated throughout the country. That however doesn't stop people from putting up Christmas trees or from decorating their homes. Their season doesn't focus upon the birth of Jesus, but rather is a time to celebrate and show love for each other. The next stop is in China where Jesus and Christmas are not really celebrated. For the few Christians in the country the churches will be filled on Christmas Eve to celebrate the birth of Jesus. Those observing Christmas will decorate a tree with lights and paper chains, paper flowers, and paper lanterns. It is a time of celebration for those that know Jesus and the story of his birth.

In Russia, they couldn't observe Christmas until the government lifted the ban against Christianity. Their celebrations are simple and are filled with the ritual of sprinkling special water to bless their homes. Afterwards they gather and eat a bowl of hot cereal from a common bowl to remind them of their family unity and oneness. They will attend a Christmas Eve service that usually last the whole night until sunrise. In the Ukraine they may celebrate Christmas Day on two different days because they use two different calendars. Their celebrations can happen on December 25th and others happen on January 7th. It is confusing, but their traditions are nice as they place a loaf of bread on the Christmas Eve dinner table that has a tall lit candle to announce that Christ is the light of the world. Also, they place stalks of wheat on the table to remind them of the hay where Jesus lay in the manger.

The Czech Republic begins their observance of Advent and Christmas by fasting or refraining from eating meat and eggs or from drinking milk. They use this time to be very serious as they confess their sins and make their hearts ready for the arrival of Jesus. Then on Christmas Day they have a tradition of putting their dinner plates on fish scales to bring themselves good luck. The government tried to outlaw Christmas and baby Jesus, but it didn't work so now they worship Jesus again on Christmas Eve. In the country of Poland, the people lead up to Christmas by fasting and having the mother clean and sweep the house clean of everything. The cleaning is a symbol of them wanting a clean heart, the fasting is a symbol of their desire to express their need for forgiveness of their sins. Then after the first star appears on Christmas Day they begin a feast of twelve different courses - one for



each of Jesus' disciples. When they set the table, they leave one empty chair just in case they should have a stranger stop by their house.

In Germany the Christmas season is celebrated by having an advent wreath in their homes starting with the fourth Sunday before Christmas and by having advent calendars that have tiny windows which they open each day starting on December 1st.

They do focus upon the idea that they need to be prepared for the arrival of Christ on Christmas Day. On Christmas Eve they

gather to read the story of Jesus' birth from the Bible, to sing Christmas carols, and then they open their presents.

In the towns and villages of Sweden the girls compete to see who will be given the privilege to wear the Saint Lucia crown. Lucia was a young woman who carried food to those who are in need. As the legend tells Lucia had so much in her arms that she had a crown on her head with lit candles. On the morning of December 13th, the youngest girl in each family puts on a white robe with a red sash and a crown of evergreens and the candles. Then they wake up their parents



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and serve them coffee and Lucia buns. As they get ready for Christmas Day, they sing Christmas carols and make plans of who they will invite that is lonely to join them for Christmas dinner. On Christmas day itself they gather at church to sing before they return home to open presents and to share in the feast that has been prepared.

Sailing down from Sweden we stop in the Netherlands. Before we start the full Christmas celebration we see a special feast in honor of the patron saint of sailors, St. Nicholas. The children all believe that their wooden shoes will be filled with gifts. Most people however know that Christmas is really a celebration of Jesus' birth, so the churches are filled and overflowing on Christmas Day. Once the service is over, we return to our homes to share in a feast of salmon, fish, and eel for the Christmas meal. They celebrate the birth of Jesus and commemorate that we are a seafaring nation, so all our meals have some fish in the meal.

We then traveled to Spain to begin our Christmas preparation which starts on December 8th. The celebration is filled with Christmas trees, gifts, and feasting. We go to church on Christmas Day and then return to our homes to share the feast with family and friends. Before the celebration ends, we go outside where swings have been set up in the parks and courtyards to swing and sing Christmas carols. Christmas gifts are not opened until



Epiphany on January 6th when we celebrate the arrival of the wise men who brought their gifts to the baby Jesus.

Our journey of traditions is almost at the end as we descend upon Greece and the Greek Isles. Their celebration is very traditional but different as they will take sprigs of basil that is wrapped around a wooden cross that is then dipped in water so that the house can be sprinkled to drive out evil

spirits from the house. They ask God to bless them throughout Advent and Christmas every day. They make some spicy golden bread called Christ bread which is molded into large loaves with a crispy crust. They focus on the life of Christ and the celebration of his birth.

In Iraq there are very few Christians because most of the people are Muslim. In 2008, the government began to allow Christmas celebrations and declared Christmas as an official holiday. On Christmas Eve the children gather and read the story of the Nativity from the Arabic Bible while the adults hold candles. When the service ends on Christmas Day the pastor leads the people in the touch of peace. The pastor touches one person who in turn touches another person, this continues until everyone has received the touch of peace. We pray for peace as we continue to search for lasting peace in our country and around the world.

We finally arrive at where the Christmas traditions all started so many years ago in the town of Bethlehem. The big celebration takes place on Christmas Eve in the Church of the Nativity at Manger Square. The church is located over the place where it is believed that Jesus was born, and Mary sang to her baby. Next door to the Church of the Nativity is the Saint Catherine's Church where many of the visitors visit and celebrate the birth of Jesus on Christmas Eve and throughout the year. At these churches they pray for world peace.

As we celebrate this Christmas time with its many traditions may we remember that this is a time to celebrate and sing of the Jesus' birth. However, you celebrate may you never forget the story of what happened so long ago in the town of Bethlehem when Jesus was given to us a gift from God. For Christmas is a time of recalling the story of love, peace, and joy fulfilled in a tiny baby. We recall this story through traditions of worship, prayer, singing, and feasting. May this Christmas be a time to remember your old traditions and an opportunity to encompass new traditions as we learn from one another every day.

#### **Don't Miss Christmas!**


Theme: Don't mistake all the tinsel and lights for the real meaning of Christmas.
