Churches are constantly needing to adapt so that we remain vital in people's lives as we compete with so many other activities for their time and financial support.

The Church & Pastoral Relations Committee met recently to evaluate the minister's and congregation's performance and to develop a formal procedure to evaluate their mutual performance during the upcoming years. Those taking part in the meeting included Eileen Berger, Beth Porell, Ruth Carpentier & Paul Stansel.

The consensus of the group is that the Minister has very effectively guided the congregation thru the difficult times we have experienced during the last 2 years. His leadership has kept the church alive during the pandemic. In addition he has been instrumental in bringing the church back toward "normal" operation during the last six months.

For the next meeting of the Church & Pastoral Relations Committee, we recommend that the membership be increased

temporarily for the purpose of setting goals and objectives for the church for next several years. This planning meeting should include the Minister and additional members representing the congregation. These goals will be re-evaluated by the Minister and the Church & Pastoral Relations Committee as necessary.

Based on the Minister's leadership during the recent difficult times it is the recommendation of the Church & Pastoral Relations Committee that his salary for the next year be increased by a minimum of 4.5%.

Topics are as follows for these dates:


January 5 – "Anchor Yourself in God's Love" based on Matthew 3:1-17

In our response to the ever-rising infection rate related to COVID-19 and the various variants that are in the area, the Deacon's voted to re-institute the masking protocols for gatherings in the church building. They are requiring that masks be worn while in the building without regard to vaccination status. They further ask that unvaccinated individuals who choose to remain unvaccinated, refrain from entering our facility unless they cannot be vaccinated for medical reasons or for those who are not eligible to be vaccinated.

The Christmas Concert

Gavin Klein

The featured artist is Gavin Klein who is an accomplished organist, pianist, and harpsichordist from Bolton. Gavin is currently a senior at Nashoba Regional High School. With a background in early music and keyboard studies since he was four, Gavin took on the organ



at the age of 12, and is currently an organ student of C. Henry Mason, director of music at Immaculate Conception Parish in Worcester. Among his accomplishments includes that he has performed at prestigious venues in both the US and Europe before reaching the age of 16. He is a member of both the American Guild of Organists, National Pastoral Association of Musicians, and the Organ Historical Society.

Gavin has served as organist to a number of congregations and currently serves as organist at Rollstone Congregational Church in Fitchburg. He also is the organist for the Sisters of St. Benedict Center (*MICM), in Still River, and he directs a Schola Cantorum at Our Lady of the Holy Rosary Parish in Gardner. In 2020, he was given the position of Artist-in-Residence at the Harvard Historical Society, in Harvard, where he regularly gives monthly

concerts. Gavin is also a Chorister at All Saints Episcopal Church in Worcester.

Gavin spends much of his free time composing sacred music. He is currently working on a Mass setting inspired by the works of Giovanni Palestrina, and has already written four different chorale works. Outside of music, Gavin enjoys to ski, go hiking, and spend time with his friends and family. 

History of the Nativity Scene Who created the first Nativity scene?

A famous Saint brought us this most beloved Christmas tradition.

There was a deacon in Italy in the 13th century who had a special love for the Child Jesus and he worked on a plan to inspire this same love in the townspeople. In the year 1223, in a cave near the town of Greccio, he set up a manger and brought a real ox and donkey to play their part. He invited the people to a midnight service at the cave, and they came, the forest ringing with song and bright with candlelight. After chanting the Gospel, the deacon preached a sermon about the Babe of Bethlehem. He kept the manger empty, since the Child had not arrived yet. But one man, a holy citizen and former soldier who was a friend of the deacon, said that he saw in the manger, a beautiful, radiant Child. He witnessed the deacon gathering this Child devoutly in his arms.

The deacon was none other than St. Francis of Assisi, and this is the story of the first Nativity scene, as related by St. Bonaventure in his biography of St. Francis. Bonaventure also relates that the hay from that first crèche was saved by

the townspeople in attendance and that it miraculously cured ailing cattle.

It's clear that nativity scenes had enormous popular appeal. St. Francis' display came in the middle of a period when mystery or miracle plays were a popular form of entertainment and education for European laypeople. These plays, originally performed in churches and later performed in town squares, re-enacted Bible stories in common languages. Since church services at the time were performed only in Latin, which virtually no one understood, miracle plays were the only way for laypeople to learn scripture. St. Francis nativity scene used the same method of visual display to help locals understand and emotionally engage with Christianity. When we put our Nativity sets out this Christmas, we are continuing a tradition that was started by Saint Francis nearly 800 years ago.



Amen.


