### The Pastor's Reflection

t seems as if only yesterday we were celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem. The mood was joyful and festive with presents, food, and family gatherings. The mood has continued to be festive as we will witness the triumphant entry of Jesus into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday with the children singing Hosanna! Blessed is He who is the King of Israel! The experience of that day was filled not only with the palms and the shouts from the crowds, but also a cheerfulness that you might see at the homecoming football game or parade. The crowd was whipped up in a frenzy to a point that they were dancing in the streets. On this day Jesus was praised, admired, and greeted with welcoming arms. And then, as quickly as the crowd was praising him, they suddenly turned on him and started to mock and ridicule him, much like the mood when the home team is losing badly and the crowd turns and yells at the players, coaches, and even the referees.

Jesus then endured a week of being mocked, scorned, ridiculed, and betrayed. Jesus remained the course even during a difficult time knowing that he was fulfilling God's plan. Frequently when we run into difficult times and situations our initial response is to run and hide and pray that this situation will pass from us. It is during these situations that we should be running towards God rather than for away from him. When a bad trial is happening to us or around us how do we respond? Do we speak up or out from the injustice that is being done? Do we find forgiveness in our


hearts to offer a second chance? Do we put it on the line and risk it all? Our human nature causes us to become defensive and we run, we run as fast as our legs will carry us. When we run away, we forsake all that we have been faithful and loyal to throughout our lives.

Our running is a defensive mechanism we utilize if we believe that we can either shield or protect ourselves from whatever we are facing. Unfortunately, when we run, we create pain and abandonment for those closest to ourselves and even ourselves. The week that leads us from Palm Sunday to the cross of Good Friday should continue to be a source of encouragement since we know that God's plan was being carried forth for our salvation and redemption. Even in Jesus' darkest moments when it appeared that everyone including God had abandoned and deserted him, we all are called to stand by him as he has stood by us. To stand by him is an act of trust and faith that God will make all things right. God is calling each of us now to be engaged in the journey that must go through the cross of calvary.

I invite each of you to gather with us as a family to hold each other close as we approach the cross of Jesus Christ in the knowledge that when we come out on the other side, we will experience the joyful Alleluia! Alleluia! Christ has risen! I hope to see all of you this coming Holy Week as we walk with Christ so that we may share in his glorious resurrection.

Until she walks outside on Easter morning and finds the most beautiful lily she has

ever seen. Through the unique gift of a bulb, Maggie discovers the power of grace and forgiveness (for being so ungrateful) and the true meaning of Easter.

The Bible tells us that Easter brings a very special "surprise" - Jesus is found alive. Some surprises, like the gift of the lily, make us happy, but the best reason to be happy for Easter Day is that Jesus is alive, and he loves us very much! That is what we celebrate at Easter!

#### Day Camp Set for June 27-July 1



# **Hymn Story** "The Old Rugged Cross"

eorge Bennard (1873 – 1958) was an American hymn composer and preacher. He was born in Youngstown, Ohio, in 1873 and spent his childhood in Iowa. After his conversion in a Salvation Army meeting, he and his wife became brigade leaders before leaving the organization for the Methodist Church.

In 1910, Bennard began his own ministry and he traveled throughout the Midwest holding revivals. In the year 1912 Bennard was ridiculed at a revival meeting in Michigan. Troubled by the disregard for the gospel, Bennard turned to Scripture to reflect on the work of Christ on the cross. He

later recalled, "I seemed to have a vision, I saw the Christ and the cross inseparable." The melody to his hymn "The Old Rugged Cross" came easily, and the first verse was completed during a series of meetings in Albion, Michigan. Several months later, the remaining three verses were completed as he was leading meetings at a local church.


Loved for its rhythmical melody and words of personal trust in Christ, "The Old Rugged Cross" remains one of the most cherished hymns of the Christian faith. It has since been included in numerous hymnals and has been recorded by many contemporary artists, and performed as a favorite country gospel hymn.

On a hill far away, stood an old rugged Cross, The emblem of suffering and shame, And I love that old Cross where the dearest and best For a world of lost sinners was slain.

So I'll cherish the old rugged Cross Till my trophies at last I lay down; I will cling to the old rugged Cross, And exchange it some day for a crown.


# What will you be served at that price?
