Rollstone Again Hosts Artists For Citywide Cultural Event

Following up on the popularity of last year's participation, Rollstone Congregational Church will once again open Cookman Hall to the public to host three local artists as part of Fitchburg Open Studios celebration, Saturday and Sunday, September 24 - 25, from 11 am to 5 pm.

As part of the celebration, the Thurston Consort will perform a concert of early New England Composers in Rollstone's sacristy from 1-2 pm on Sunday September 25. All are invited and there is no charge for the concert.

Fitchburg Open Studios is one of the most interesting, entertaining, and instructive events on the city's annual calendar and it is entirely free. For two days local artists will either open their home studios to the public or create "pop-up" displays in buildings throughout the city. More than 30 artists will host exhibits as part of the festival.

The event, which is sponsored by the Fitchburg Cultural Council, is regional and the art displays run

the gamut from oils, watercolors, and illustrations, to sculpture, pottery, weavings and more. While about half of the artists will display in Fitchburg, others will make their home studios available throughout the area. Brochures and maps will be available at City Hall, the Fitchburg Art Museum, the Fitchburg Cultural Alliance headquarters, and other places in the city.

The three artists, who will be displaying at Rollstone Church on both days, are connected with the Massachusetts Women's Caucus for the Arts.
